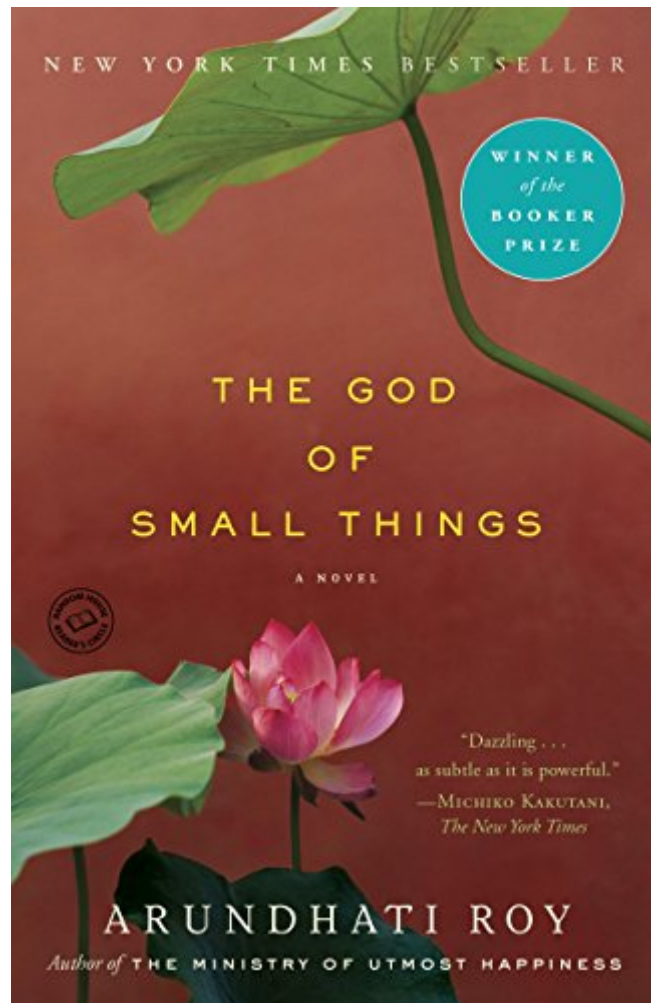

This novel takes place in southern India and follows the life of the twins Esthappen and Rahel. It is 1969 and the Marxist Uprising is very prominent in the state of Kerala. Through a series of flashbacks and present day scenes, Roy creatively illustrates the unbecoming of their family through secrecy, loss of innocence, and tragedy. This was one of the best books I have had to read for a class. It throws the twins into a situation they never dreamed of being in and shows how one person's mistakes can affect an entire family. While reading, you slowly begin to see the children lose their innocence and trust in the good things that their world has to offer, which ultimately hardens their hearts. The conclusion of this novel was very tragic and made me cry. When you learn who the "God of Small Things" is it makes you so happy but you also know what is going to happen and it is so upsetting. But once the twins are reunited as adults, they realize that there was always that special connection between them, even if it isn't the connection you expect. Roy's work successfully shows the corruption of India's current Love Laws and Caste System. She breaks down borders and builds her characters around

these strict laws but allows them to step out of bounds. Through her social commentary, Roy thoroughly describes to the reader what needs to be changed in India. Roy is a fresh and strong voice that stands up against the laws of her land, showing others that change is necessary. 4.3 Stars
