

Playing Through The Whistle: Steel, Football, And An American Town



Synopsis

In the early twentieth century, down the Ohio River from Pittsburgh, the Jones & Laughlin Steel Company built one of the largest mills in the world and a town to go with it. Aliquippa was a beacon and a melting pot, pulling in thousands of families from Europe and the Jim Crow south. The J&L mill, though dirty and dangerous, offered a chance at a better life. It produced the steel that built American cities and won World War II and even became something of a workers' paradise. But then, in the 1980s, the steel industry cratered. The mill closed. Crime rose and crack hit big. But another industry grew in Aliquippa. The town didn't just make steel; it made elite football players, from Mike Ditka to Ty Law to Darrelle Revis. Pro football was born in Western Pennsylvania, and few places churned out talent like Aliquippa. Despite its troubles—maybe even because of them—Aliquippa became legendary for producing football greatness. A masterpiece of narrative journalism, *Playing Through the Whistle* tells the remarkable story of Aliquippa and through it, the larger history of American industry, sports, and life. Like football, it will make you marvel, wince, cry, and cheer.

I live about 50 miles from Aliquippa so I'm familiar with the success they have had on the football field. The book really gives you the feel for the depression that the town is experiencing with the shutdown of the steel industry and everything that had provided work for the residents. It's more than a book about the stars that have made the town famous. The research must have been extensive and the quality of the story shows that. Worthwhile read for sports fans that want to go beyond the headlines to the more inside story.

Having been born in Aliquippa, PA and living in Western PA until my early 20s, the book was very fascinating just because i knew just about every area the writer discussed. It was even more interesting to read about family members in the book. I had a grandfather nearly beaten to death in the 1930s due to Union Activities at J and L. I remember the smoke stacks pouring out sulfur smelling smoke, the blue flames at night from the oxygen plant. Aliquippa is merely a shell of what it was compared to living there in the late 60s early 70s. Its not even a safe place to walk the streets anymore.

This was a wonderful read that pulled together the history of a town and its people as seen through the lense of the rise and fall of the steel industry. Even if you're not familiar with the town of Aliquippa, or not a football fan, you'll see how the intersection of big industry and immigration resulted in a microcosm of all the good and bad of American society in one small town in western PA. I'll be interested in a relook 10 years from now to see if there is any successful turnaround in the works.

Having lived and worked in Aliquippa, I was totally absorbed in this well researched and unbiased literary masterpiece. Anyone who wants to understand the geopolitical and social realities of the demise of the industrial revolution, and its effects on this once vibrant and still proud community, will be deeply enlightened by reading this book.
