

Curtis makes a good case for Stonehenge containing information about the planetary orbits which had to have come from an intelligent source that was beyond its time. I am not convinced about it being the site of Babel. The Bible says clearly that the Tower of Babel was made in the plane of Sinar and near to where Babylon was founded.

George has written a five-star book of thoughtful alternatives to conventional religion and science, that other belief system that co-rules most of the inhabitants of the world. I would suggest that the mistake(s) made by the Elohim was the "coming in unto" the daughters of men by the sons of gods,

outside of any laboratory control, creating offspring that retained their world-survival ability to kill (quite rightly) their food, while also retaining their race-memory (Elohim) of superiority, carried ever since by those that regard themselves as superior to all others either racially, religiously, economically or scientifically with all the disastrous consequences well-commented on by history, both ancient and modern. Re Stonehenge, an arithmetical error. On Kindle page 194 360/56 is posted as 6.425754998 degrees. According to my PC calculator the correct answer is 6.42857etc, an interesting number when googled with the following word "harmonic", a number having quite a few references to a large range of engineering applications, among them electrogravity. There is speculation that Stonehenge, among other things, was a form of battery as well, and may have been a sign to those of sufficient intelligence that anti-gravity was being used by the Elohim. I empathise with George re his "hour of darkness". I went through the same process in my early teens, where everything that bolstered my beliefs and my very being was suddenly stripped away, a sudden and traumatic introduction into 'cosmic consciousness'. Perhaps that is the very reason the religious and the scientists are afraid of encountering anything outside their beliefs, who knows? This excellent book challenges those beliefs, and backs it all up with the language of science, mathematics. Compelling reading, whether one agrees with George on everything or not.

The idea that Noah led a group of people clear across Turkey, Europe and to the British isles and Stonehenge, and that Stonehenge is 'the Tower of Babel, is a bit hard to swallow. Noah was a righteous man who obeyed God. How could he have led out in building The Tower of Babel which was built in outright disobedience to God? It is far more logical to think the Flood survivors would have followed the Euphrates river from its source near Ararat, and moved south and East, then probably turned West [thus moving from the East] Genesis 10:2 into the land of Shinar - which means two rivers. Where else could Shinar have been but between the two rivers, Euphrates and Tigris? You certainly do not have two rivers near Stonehenge! And you would have been out of luck if you wanted to make mud bricks near Stonehenge, which anyway is not made of bricks but stone brought from Wales. Babylon seems an obvious derivation from Babel. Babylon existed way back in history around 2000 BCE and was founded by Nimrod Genesis 11:2. and archeology confirms this completely. I appreciated some of the interesting ideas concerning how the Flood of Noah could have taken place and how the ancient people knew so much about astronomy. After reading it I made a big pot of tea and had some biscuits as well because I had a head ache!

This book is... interesting... in a weird sort of way. The author claims to have found "order"

in Stonehenge's design. He further claims to have found a message "encoded" within the monument; a message he then ties to the solar system. This message pertains to a relationship between the distances of the orbits of the planets that he "proves mathematically" Since I just finished the book, I have not taken steps to validate his "mathematical proof" or determine whether there are alternate explanations for his results. That would require a second, slower, more analytical reading. So I reserve judgement on that, neither declaring it erroneous or correct. He then goes on to comment on the "real" story of the Bible. His observations are not unlike those of others who claim we were visited by "others" (extraterrestrials) with high technological prowess, in the past. But he then rambles on about the coming end of the world in a way that is reminiscent of some biblical writers, except in more modern terms. There is some melodrama and, if you look for them, you'll find some logical contradictions interspersed in his narrative. His "analysis" is not as good as Zachariah Zitchin's, but it's entertaining at times. If his math and his logic were to hold up and there were no alternate explanations, this might be an interesting contribution to the genre. My recommendation? Read if you have some spare time and don't have a better book.

Mr. Curtis has a lot of valuable information in his book, and he has pointed to some things that would give most people something to seriously think about. I do hope, however, that Mr Curtis will continue his research as he may find that things are not so simple and that there is a deeper level of truth than he is presently aware of. I think his argument about 'why the gods were so angry over the Tower of Babel is a little weak, and there is a lot more to the story than he is presenting. Also, although there is something literal behind many of the stories, they are also allegorical and prophetic. The Tower of Babel story is an allegory of the United Nations, and the 70 gods that came down to scatter men is an allegory for the 70 nations that France has decided to include in their conference for dealing harshly with Israel. Mr. Curtis would do well to entertain these thoughts and realize that the story is much deeper than most anyone recognizes. This is not just true of this story, but stories throughout the Bible.
