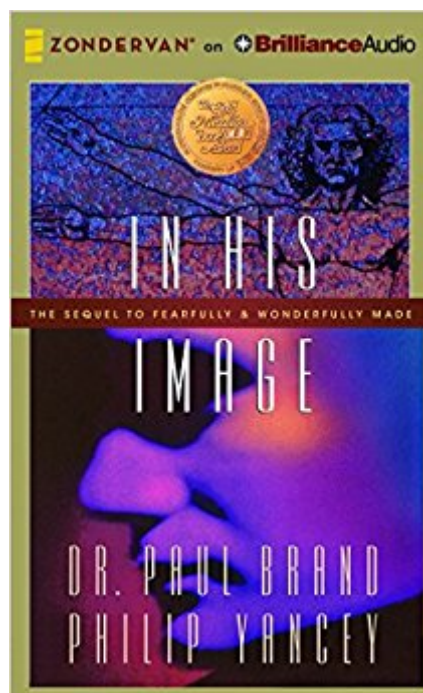

What an awesome book! A doctor who worked as a missionary in Asia goes chapter by chapter explaining about the functioning of the human body and comparing it with the functioning of the body of Christ. My favorite chapter was looking at blood. Just as blood cleanses the human body by capturing waste products and then brings them to the lungs or other organs where they are expelled, so the "blood of Jesus Christ cleanses us from all unrighteousness". If you remember John 6:61 Jesus tells his disciples that his followers must drink his blood and eat his body, which resulted in many followers leaving. Tying this in with the fact that the "life is in the blood", the author explains how terrible this must have sounded to a kosher Jew, but how it is a perfect picture of believers being united with Christ and identified with him through communion. I highly recommend this book to give you a more complete understanding of what it means for believers to be part of the body of Christ.

My family and I enjoyed reading this together. It really was informative and spiritually thought-provoking, a science and Bible lesson all in one. The kids clamored for more. They are 12 and 15 years old.

Daughter: Recently I read the book, *In His Image* written by Philip Yancey based on the insights of Dr. Paul Brand. This book challenges the reader to look beyond our normal scope of vision, and delves into a something we see but often overlook. The narrator Dr. Paul Brand, helps us look through the many different systems of the human body while instilling a feeling of wonder inside us. Dr. Brand was excellent at portraying this sense of wonder by making use of vivid and descriptive stories. I also was not partial to this particular writing style but that is merely personal preference .However, after all this is said and done, I do appreciate the author in several regards. First, his willingness to discuss this topic. Second, his unapologetic nature regarding scripture. Lastly, this inclusion of scripture to the degree he presented. This particular title was not a chore to read nor was a "bad" book, it just didn't live up to my expectations.
