From this modest of beginnings, Ms. Hamer would go on to challenge the President of the United States, the National Democratic Party, members of Congress and the American people about fulfilling the promised of democracy. She was the first black women ever seated on the floor of the House and the first black Mississippians since 1882. She opposed the war in Vietnam from the beginning. She organized programs to feed poor people, tend to their ills, house them and clothes them, train them for jobs. Fannie Lou Hamer was born in the Mississippi Delta. This was the place of the Senate seat of this wild eyed racist that American has ever known. Senator Eastland (Senator Jesse Helms was a political midget compared to Eastland). This is the place where Federal registrar didn't dare shown there face and when they did they would pretend to be having business somewhere else. So this is the place where white men terrorize black people. Not just men, but women and children too. There was one more crucial element that molded this poor sharecropper into a leader\_ it was anger, touched with sorrow was the lack of control over her own life.
